I do because I am mixed. Being mixed makes it easier for me than what a fully black person has to go through, however we are not immune to racism (from my own communities or others).

I have seen it mentioned a few time, however I am not really familiar with this word. I don't think I'd used it because it seems to refer to African communities specifically?

What is a community for you?

A community is defined by a culture, experiences and an ethnic background shared by a group of people.

I think the black community is divided when it comes to specific issues like colorism, but can be very solid when it comes to experiences related to racism for example.

My mother was born and raised in Ivory Coast. My father (he's white) however, was born and raised in France. My mother considers herself as Ivorian, and so do I. My father views himself as French, and so do I.

What does being integrated means to you?

Not much. Whenever I would hear the word "integrated" it was in a negative context. It was often utilised to convey the "bon immigré" model.

What nationality do you consider to have and how do you feel about yourself as being a citizen of France?

Since I'm not a dual citizen, and considering that I only went to Ivory Coast once, I should say that I am French. When I'm abroad, I'm "the French girl". However, in France, I feel like citizenship is still attached to whiteness. Due to my proximity to this latter, I am privileged, but generally speaking it seems that non-white French ppl tend to be treated and perceived as "second rank citizens".

What does being attached means to you?

Having a feeling of belonging to a certain place. Whether it is physically, emotionally or intellectually.

How attached do you feel toward you city, your country or the home country of your parents/grandparents? Can you compare it?

I don't really feel attached to my city, I'm just used to it. When it comes to France, I am having a hard time figuring this out. Mostly because of the current social context and my experience. But I am attached to certain aspects of France e.g food, some landscapes and habits. Then, I haven't spent much time in Ivory Coast (only two months when I was 10). Therefore my attachment to it is different to the one that I have to France. To some extent, the only experience that I had of the Ivorian society, was through my family, friends and other Ivorians. (But also the news, my readings and researches). Still, I have a deep affection for Ivory Coast. I was never given the feeling that I wasn't Ivorian (though I was perceived as white, and French there).

If you had to describe your city to a tourist, how would you describe it?

I live in Seine-et-Marne, so I would probably say "it's near Disneyland". Then I would tell them about the mall and variety of shops, Burger King and good kebab spots. I would tell them about the lakes and parks. My city is quite versatile, you can have a nice time here if you're staying at a hotel during a trip in France. Plus, you can go pretty much anywhere if you live here. I actually might be attached to it.

What kind of role do you think the city you come from played in the way how you see yourself? Do you think it was specific to that city?

Well, when I attended a few classes in Paris, I saw myself as the "country girl" (and I was the only black person in the entire class). I felt like I didn't belong there. It wasn't specific to my city, but rather to the fact that I was non-Parisian and black. They all knew each other, and had specific norms. I also attended a private (and predominantly white) secondary school/high school. There, my city didn't impact the way that I perceived myself, but it impacted the way my classmates did. I came from a public school in a popular neighbourhood -in which I lived- so some of them perceived me as less capable, and poor. In high school, I moved twice (each time in popular areas of my city) and sometimes I would feel ashamed to say where I lived. Because when I talked about my city, they would instantly mention the bad reputation that my neighbourhood had. Growing up, I stopped feeling that way about my neighbourhood, it's part of my story, of who I am. Though no one knows me in my city/neighbourhood besides my friends. I remember meeting someone at a party in a city that was miles away from mine. It turns out that we were from the same city but the first thing they said was: "How come have I never seen you ???" Our city is quite populated ( over 23k ppl) but it's just that I never go out ( and didn't go to school there).

How would you describe yourself to another person? (with adjectives)

Tough question !!! People generally say that I'm kind and curious, well-rounded, that I am an extrovert or an introvert (depending on who's describing me I guess). They sometimes tell me that I'm funny or pretty (but I would not use those to describe myself).

What advice would you give to another black person coming to live in your city?

I would recommend them the beauty supply store near the train station bc the owner is really nice. But since it's a bit overpriced, I would also tell them about the one in the next city. I would also offer them the address of some good dermatologists, doctors and therapists in the vicinity.

Do you think the race question is an issue for you? How often do you consider race?

I'm not sure that I understood the question (is it generally speaking or in the context of my city?). But I don't think that being socially aware and deconstructing the way that race impacts our experiences and access to ressources in our society is negative at all. I consider race on a daily basis.

Have you ever heard of the word Afropean? What do you think of it, would you use it in relation to you?

Yes, I heard of it quite recently while reading an article. I'm still a bit unfamiliar with this notion and its implications. I've heard it in a British context. But I think that it could be useful to consider the specificity of afrodescendants' experiences in Europe. I think that I could use it after doing more research on the subject.

What is a community for you?

As far as I am concerned, a community is a group of people to which you feel related. The members of this group generally share common characteristics, a common history, a common culture...

We often consider black people as part of a big community, what is your opinion on that?

So far, I am quite okay with this consideration as long as we acknowledge the individuality of each black person. Although I noticed that for instance black women in France could share similar concerns and experiences with BW from the UK or the USA, some specificities remained. There are some situations where one can't fully relate to another's experience. Especially if we decentralise the discussion from the Western area. For instance I don't know if generally speaking, African Americans would have this sentiment of community towards someone from Africa. I think that we should still consider the impact of the "American culture" and the vision of the world that it conveys.

Would you say that two black persons from different countries have more in common with each other than they have with their white compatriots? What about other non-white compatriots?

I would say yes, but on different levels depending on the chosen areas of the world. Considering certain aspects such as class makes the question hard to answer directly. It's even harder when it comes to other non-white compatriots because we share some aspects of the experience of not being the norm in the specific context of our country. However, we still have to consider certain power dynamics between non-white people and black people. We share some experiences as non-white compatriots, but one may feel closer to the experience of a black person from a different country than a non-black compatriot.

Do you have examples of moments where you felt different from other people in your city/country?

Yes, those moments were mostly related to the fact that I am also a queer neuroatypical person. Some people of my city literally bullied a man out of his city because he was gay. This feeling was sometimes due to the confrontation between the way I had been socialised in secondary school/ high school and the socialization that I received previously or when I was with some friends of mine.
