

Abstract:

This thesis deals with the topic of international reasons for the entry of the United States into World War II in the context of relations with Great Britain. The thesis aims to analyze what events and their effects affected the relations of these countries and what influenced the entry of the United States into the war in December 1941. It examines the various aspects of relations such as diplomatic disputes and cooperation, contacts, strategic planning or also rivalry and cooperation in the field of economy and supply. At the same time, mutual relations and the pre-war American position are contrasted with the American domestic political situation and isolationism. The work is limited in time to the years 1933-1941, from the accession of Franklin D. Roosevelt to the presidency until the entry of the United States into World War II.
