### ADDITIONAL WRITTEN COMMENTS

#### **Reviewer 1**

Generally, the work is solid, well sourced, logic and complex. Very good is the description of ninja / shinobi history, and their activities.

Very good is also wide bibliography. It is necessary to mention big advantage of the author – her mother language is Japanese, which allows her not only to read documents in Japanese but also to speak directly with Japanese academics dealing with the topic.

Certain formal mistakes (e.g. in bibliography) were identified. There are also two chapters with the same title (“Source of Intelligence”) and the second one (3.2) is relatively illogically included in the bigger chapter dealing with “Shinobi in Fighting”.

Conclusion, especially the topic of “Applicability of Ninja Intelligence and Arts in the Contemporary World” as is also stated in the title of dissertation should be developed more preciously.

#### **Reviewer 2**

The study was very original in its focus. There was a largely coherent setting out of the structure, and approach for the chapters. It could have been helpful further to have developed some of the initial discussion around methodology (such as when talking about ‘standard’ methods or models) although this was more clearly established as the work progressed.

Case studies were subject to detailed argument in the chapters, making very good use of different materials consulted. There were a few of the potentially interesting concepts which could be explored more, such as the early discussion of peace and war being less clearly defined in Sengoku Era, which could be regarded as increasingly aligning with current reconceptualising of conflict.

The dissertation was largely well presented, including in links between sections and chapters. A few typographical/formatting changes would enhance this (including in some cases more noticeable, such as one or two headings). The conclusion provided a useful summary – some of the findings, expressed more in the earlier chapters, could have been further highlighted here.

A very original dissertation concept, drawing on a wealth of literature and contextual material, providing very interesting reflections on potential application of ninja arts to contemporary security. It could be improved by selective development of points and framing, but nonetheless represents a novel and thoroughly researched contribution to this developing field.
