## **ABSTRACT**

Sunday Herald is the date of its establishment, the year 1891, the oldest expatriate general periodical. It represents an interesting probe into the way of thinking expatriate community over time, due to historicals events in Europe is also becoming a journal created by exiles. Reflection on the events of 1989 shows the wiewpoint of its creators, for the most part voluntary contributors evaluation evolution from a distance and taking into account their own life experiences and ideas. Texts excel straightforward rawness, linguistic style and emphasis on the Czech national tradition reminiscent of the world thought the first half of the twentieth century. The reason is the mix of authors and contributors, there are basically two groups, the first, settlers living in the United States for many generations are taking linguistic composition of the czech language and intellectual world of his parents and grandparents, second, post "February,, and a smaller part, post "August,, exiles to bring the picture of home in form, it would be remembered at the time of their escape. In the political orientation of articles and news commentaries outweighs consistent anticommunism with certain elements of Christian conservatism. There are also anti-Semitism, a racist subtext include articles from South African expatriates. The focus of some text, certainly not constitute a majority, has attracted the attention of some Czech politicians and the media from the fringes of the political spectrum. Journal of the Republican Party, Alliance for the Republic of Miroslav Sladek some of the articles quotes directly, particularly negative assessment of the economic reform and pejorative assessment of the causes and course of so-called "Velvet Revolution. " However, I dare say that such artickles shape only a small part of the overall profile.
