**Abstract:** 

This thesis analyzes and describes the use of finite progressive forms in Arts and Humanities

university lectures. The finite forms are explored with respect to their lexical and grammatical

properties, and the results are compared to those of Ute Römer (2005), who studied the

functions of finite progressive forms in spoken British English. An overview of functions of the

progressive, depicted in various grammars, is included. There is also a separate chapter

dedicated to the character of a lecture as a specific type of spoken academic discourse. One

hundred utterances excerpted from the BASE corpus have been analyzed. An overview of the

functions and purposes of the progressive found in the university lectures is given in the

analytical part of this thesis.
