## Abstract (En)

This rigorous thesis is split into eleven chapters. Subsequently there are recognized topics such as general characteristics of internet and electronic commerce. These chapters are followed by legal regulations of legal action and contracting. The thesis is focused on relevant norms of private international law touching electronic commerce. After general articles about conflict of laws rules and direct norms, choice of law is discussed. Next chapter deals with contractual obligations regulated by the Rome convention and Rome I regulation, followed by noncontractual obligations in Rome II regulation and the International private law act. Conflict of laws rules are followed by CISG. Also other sources of regulation are mentioned, such as EU directives and UN Convention on the use of electronic communications in international contracts. In the area of civil process, relevant provisions of the Brussels I regulation are discussed. Finally thesis deals with the regulation creating a European order for payment procedure and regulation establishing a European Small Claims Procedure.
