Supervisor's Report

Galina Kiryushina, "Something Gone Wrong with the Silence: The Motif of Voice in

Samuel Beckett's Embers, Eh Joe and That Time" (BA Thesis)

Galina Kiryushina's thesis presents an accomplished analysis of the motif of voice in selected

plays by Samuel Beckett. Her work is marked by a profound understanding of some of the most

complex works by Beckett, be they dramatic or prosaic. A chief strength lies in the ability to

provide a lucid commentary on one of the most intricate and at the same time alluring motifs in

Beckett while at the same time paying meticulous attention to its different contexts within the

individual works. Moreover, the candidate makes a most judicious use of numerous secondary

sources, the principal points of which are frequently developed in an original fashion.

The choice of a radio play, a television play, and a stage play as the focal points of discussion is

strategic given the limits involved in writing a short essay that a BA thesis is; nonetheless, it also

allows the candidate to examine the author's work with different media, and discuss why the

individual works are fundamentally media-specific. My only objection to the latter aspect of the

thesis would perhaps consist in pointing out the lack of specific evidence that is provided for the

candidate's recurrent claim that aspects of the experience of working in radio or television are

used by Beckett in his later work for the stage: while this possibly may have been the case, the

causality cannot be merely assumed.

Having said that, the intellectual accomplishment, lucidity and coherence of argument, and the

imagination involved in discussing the theatrical aspects of Beckett's work in production exceed

by far the requirements for a bachelor's thesis. It is to be hoped that the candidate continues her

research by looking into Beckett's late drama and fiction, in which voices in the characters' heads

are placed even more firmly centre stage.

I recommend the thesis for defence and propose to grade it as "excellent".
