OVERALL ASSESSMENT (provided in English, Czech, or Slovak):

The aim of this thesis was to analyse the differences in living standards when using income and expenditures and treating housing costs in the Czech Republic. Daniel Vach fulfilled this objective in an excellent way.

Overall, the manuscript is clean, the literature is discussed and referenced in an adequate way and the empirical analysis – apart from answering important questions – is at a technical level appropriate for an outstanding undergraduate student of economics.

The biggest contribution is in imputing rent from housing and treating housing costs in different ways and comparing the estimates across different expenditure and income concepts.

In terms of potential policy contribution, I consider this thesis to be one of the most relevant bachelor theses that I have seen at the IES. Specifically, Daniel provides the first estimates of consumption flow from housing and shows that these results are important by applying them to assess inequality in the Czech Republic.

An important extension of this type of work for the Czech Republic might lie in estimating the flow from public services (such as health or education) that are often – similarly to housing – not included in the standard distributional analysis. Also his partial analysis of rent deregulation is insightful and might provide a fruitful area for further research (I wonder whether he has already in mind what steps he should take in order to answer some of these deregulation-related research questions).

Daniel Vach did an excellent job of writing a thesis. Therefore I recommend an overall grade of **excellent (výborně, 1)** and I recommend this thesis for the **Dean's distinction**.
