**ABSTRACT** 

This thesis compares the unreliable first-person narrator in three British novels: A Clockwork

Orange by Anthony Burgess, The Remains of the Day by Kazuo Ishiguro, and The Wasp

Factory by Iain Banks. The unreliable first-person narrative form has the power to assimilate

the reader's mind with that of the narrator and make him/her believe whatever the narrator

wants, even though the events that are being described can be truly shocking. This thesis

analyses why and how these authors use the unreliable first-person narrative form, as well as

its impacts on the reader.
